COMMUNICATION

In the past 4 1/2 years, we have come a long way in improving the quality and quantity of information sources available to our residents: a new website; an updated newsletter, now distributed four times a year; the annual *Take A Look At Parma Heights* magazine; the institution of the CodeRED advanced warning system; our city Facebook page; the mobile app PARMA HEIGHTS and, just this month, the installation of a new electronic sign in front of City Hall.

Participation

However, information is only one path to a feeling of community, the other is participation. As we continue to strive to keep you abreast of events and important information, your participation completes the circuit and helps us to key in on the issues that are most important to you. Participation can take place in a number of ways, for example: joining a club (surrounding our new sign and the façade of City Hall are beautiful plantings courtesy of our Parma Heights Garden Club), taking in a show at the Cassidy Theatre, supporting our local businesses, attending a sporting event in one of our beautiful parks, or even coming together with your neighbors to pay your respects at the Flags of Honor display which will again grace the green by our Gazebo during our Weekend in the Commons.

A Unique Opportunity

The city has been awarded a \$75,000 Transportation for Livable Communities (TLCI) grant, targeting Pearl Road for a detailed study to determine future development goals for this critical corridor. "Complete and Green Streets"

projects have been shown to stimulate local economies, raise land values, increase safety and have a positive environmental effect.



One of the first steps in the TLCI process, conducted by the engineering firm of Hatch Mott MacDonald, is to survey residents on their use of and opinions about Pearl Road. I invite you to participate in this process by completing the Pearl Road Corridor Survey found on pages 5-6 of this newsletter and return it to City Hall by mail or in person. You are also invited and encouraged to attend the three public meetings planned for lat-

er this year to discuss this comprehensive project and to share your insights.

UNDER CONSTRUCTION

This year has seen a number of new businesses coming to Parma Heights and we extend a warm welcome to all of these new members of our community. The new shops on Pearl Road that Economic Development Director Joe Sebes covers in his section are plainly visible, but the Tri-C expansion off York Road is somewhat hidden from sight.

Tri-C Expansion

Construction is well underway for the new Public Safety Center of Excellence on the Tri-C Western Campus. Classes are scheduled to begin in August of 2014 at the site of the former Crile Elementary School which is now being expanded to house the new Center. The \$10.1 million facility, with classrooms in Parma Heights and outdoor components in Parma, will serve first responders from the surrounding 12 county area. The renovations to Crile include reconfiguration of ten classrooms capable of accommodating up to 44 students each and the construction of an indoor shooting range and locker rooms.

New Event Center

You can't miss the activity taking place in the former Integrity truck building. Originally purchased by Drifter

Sport Bag, Inc. as part of their world headquarters which is still located on Pearl Road, this building on the adjacent parcel has now changed hands and will become an event venue called the Malloy & Esposito Celebration Center. The extensive \$1.3 million indoor/outdoor renovation is moving along under an accelerated schedule, with hopes that the new hall for party rentals will be open as early as fall, 2014.



Major Retailer

Also highly visible is the construction underway on W. 130th Street for a major new retailer coming to Parma Heights – Discount Tire. With more than 875 stores in 28 states, Discount Tire is the world’s largest independent tire and wheel retailer. Interestingly, the company was founded in 1960 by Bruce T. Halle who rented a storefront in Ann Arbor, MI with only six tires comprising his entire inventory! Growing from a small storefront not unlike the ones we have on Pearl Road, Discount Tire serves as an example of what can be accomplished when ingenuity, hard work and good fortune combine.

A BUSY YEAR AHEAD

This year is promising to be a very busy one here in Parma Heights. A number of other projects are in the planning stages and are expected to be finalized in the next few months. We will continue to keep you informed as details are made available to us.

RECOGNITION

The 2014 “Rating the Suburbs” edition of *Cleveland Magazine* includes a pop-up on page 154 featuring our city. The proximity of our neighborhoods to our parks is cited as a major contributor to the 22.4% increase in the median home sale price in our city between 2012 and 2013. Realtor Arlene Kamak of Century 21 DePiero and Associates is quoted as saying that Parma Heights is “going through a turnaround now, with younger people coming in because they want to own a home within walking distance of the Metroparks.....It’s a lovely, peaceful area to drive through.”

I couldn’t agree more and I look forward to see you out and about - especially at our Weekend in the Commons in August - as we enjoy the summer months in the beautiful city we call home.

SWIMMING POOL

Summer and warm weather are finally here and our waterpark located in the Greenbrier Commons is now open. GRILLING SAFETY

July is the peak month for grill fires and roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.

Safety tips may seem like common sense to some but it never hurts to be reminded: only use grills outdoors, well away from the house, deck railings, from under eaves or tree branches; keep children and pets at least 3 ft. away; keep your grill clean by cleaning grease or fat especially from trays below the grill; never leave grill unattended; and always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

Check the gas tank hose before using it for the first time each year by applying a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a leak, turn off the grill and get it serviced by a professional before using it again. **If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department.** If the flame goes out, turn the grill and gas valve off and wait at least 15 minutes before re-lighting it.

LIGHTNING SAFETY

If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance. Lightning often strikes outside of heavy rain and may occur as far as ten miles away from any rainfall.

Remaining outside during a thunderstorm is not safe - go indoors. Stay away from windows and doors. Seek land and shelter if you are in or on open water.

If you feel your hair stand on end, that means lightning is about to strike. If you are outside and cannot get inside, do not lie flat on the ground but make yourself into a ball with your head between your knees and hands over your ears.

If a person is struck by lightning, call 9-1-1 and get medical care immediately.

PROPERTY MAINTENANCE REMINDERS

Spring finally arrived and summer is right around the corner! It's time to be outside, enjoy the beautiful weather and the season for yard work and home improvement projects. Our Property Maintenance Inspection Program continues, with the goal of preserving the quality of properties through ongoing and proper maintenance.

The following are typical property maintenance violations:

- ♦ overgrown lawns and shrubbery;
- ♦ noxious weeds;
- ♦ detached, sagging or malfunctioning gutters and downspouts;
- ♦ chipping and peeling paint on homes and garages;
- ♦ uneven sidewalks and driveways;
- ♦ house address numbers missing or not clearly visible from the street.

Also, remember to keep your lamppost in working order and lit nightly!

CONTRACTORS

Parma Heights Ordinances require all contractors performing work in the city to be registered with the city. A call to the Building Department can verify if your contractor is registered. If they are not registered, they are required to do so before beginning any work. This protects our residents, ensures that contractors have liability insurance and provides the city with contact information if there are any problems.

Registration materials are available at the Building Department. Whether you are having a contractor do the work or you are going to tackle the project yourself, the Building Department can answer any questions you have regarding necessary permits.

PERMITS

Building Permits ensure that the proposed work is in accordance with the applicable building codes. Qualified inspectors will make inspections as the work progresses. These inspections are at no extra cost, are made at the homeowner's convenience and, most importantly, verify the work is being done safely and correctly. Please obtain necessary permits prior to the start of your project and call the Building Department to verify their issuance.

VACANT PROPERTIES

The city maintains a list of vacant properties. Many times neighbors are the best resource for information. Please contact the Building and Service Department if you suspect or know that a property is vacant and this information will be forwarded to an inspector for verification.

SPECIAL WASTE COLLECTION EVENTS

The following Special Waste Collection Events will be held at the Parma Heights Service Garage in the Greenbrier Commons between 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m.:

Household Hazardous Waste Saturday, July 12th

Accepting oil-based paints and products, fertilizers, pesticides and chemicals. Latex paint is NOT accepted.

Community Shred Event Saturday, July 26th

This free event provides a safe, secure, and convenient resource to shred confidential documents. Please limit documents to five grocery store bags or two copy-size paper boxes per family.

Yard Waste Collection

Yard waste is collected from April 15th to November 30th on your regular collection day. Yard waste can be placed out either in brown paper yard bags or in a 32 gallon can clearly marked "Yard Waste". This includes grass clippings and leaves. Small branches may be cut & bundled with rope or twine. Bundles should not exceed 40 lbs. or 3 feet in length. Bundles should be placed to next to yard waste bags or cans.

Saturday Refuse Drop Off

Excess household waste and yard waste may be dropped off at designated times at the dumpster located in the Service Yard in the Greenbrier Commons. Drop-offs take place the 2nd & 4th Saturdays of each month. Please contact the Service Department at 440.884.9607 if there any questions regarding an item for disposal.

Waste Collection Cans and Bins

Cans and bins are to be stored in your garage or backyard and not in the front of your house where the neighbors can see them. Warnings and violations will be issued.
